_ Using Word Walls

What is a word wall and why should I use one?

A word wall is a purposefully selected group of words displayed on a wall or other prominent surface in the classroom. The selected words are those that are referred to throughout a lesson or unit of study. The words are often paired with a visual representation to help ELLs.

A word wall is a well-researched approach to teaching vocabulary that supports ELL instruction. Using a word wall to build vocabulary can improve students' reading comprehension and writing style. It also reinforces students' understanding of ELAR-specific terms and key concepts.

How do I set up a word wall?

After compiling a list of words and appropriate visuals, print them and consider laminating them for increased durability. Then decide how you want to organize your word wall. The most common options are alphabetical or by category. Attach the words to a wall with a temporary adhesion method like painter's tape or velcro, as it is important that the words be easy to move so that students can use the word wall to their best advantage.

Student Activity Ideas

- Spotlight Game
 - Start by turning off the lights. Use a small flashlight to point at different words on the word wall. Have students call out an example, the meaning, a synonym, or an antonym. You can also have students take turns being in charge of the flashlight.
- Word Ad
 - Put students in small groups. Have each group pick a word from the word wall and brainstorm the different ways someone could use the word. Then have them create an advertisement to sell one of the words from the word wall. This can be presented to the class.
- Word Origins and Root Words
 - Put students in small groups or pairs. Have each group/pair find the word origin and root words of 2 or 3 word wall words and present their findings to the class in a creative way. As an optional variation, give groups a word origin and have them make a list of words from the word wall that share that origin.
- Word Interview
 - Have students take turns pretending to "be" one of the words. A student picks a word to "be" from the word wall. The class then asks questions about the meaning, origin, etc in order to guess the word. Whoever correctly guesses the word goes next.
